We need to go upstream and find out why they are falling in."

When it comes to understanding mental health and meeting the needs of those living with serious mental health conditions, the archbishop's nudge to head upstream could not be more relevant. 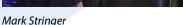

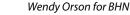

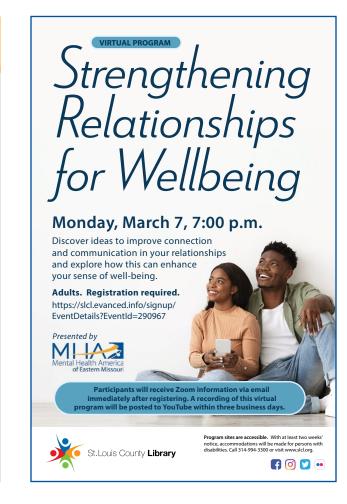

New Clinical Program Launches To Tackle Early Childhood Adversity

Mental Health America of Eastern Missouri (MHA-EM) launched the **PEACE (Preventing the Effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences) Clinical Program** in February.

"Unaddressed early childhood adversity hurts children, families, and entire communities," says Brittany Graham, LCSW, MHA-EM's Chief Program Officer. "A family's ability to provide stable, nurturing relationships and environments that children need to thrive can often be disrupted by household and community factors, including trauma, poverty,

violence, racism, abuse, neglect, and substance use. But when children have the benefit of at least one buffering adult, those mental health outcomes can improve dramatically."

The PEACE Clinical Program will launch with ABC (Attachment Biobehavioral Catch-up), a proven intervention that is a unique service in our area. ABC equips parents/primary caregivers of children (ages 6 months to 24 months) with skills to combat the impacts of toxic stress and to build resilience in their children. ABC will expand to age 48 months in 2023.
